- -The Bible is not historically accurate (and even if it was accurate, it's hopelessly misogynistic).


Throughout the school year, we'll be putting on events which address these attacks on our faith. The purpose is two-fold. We want to encourage Christian students by giving them intelligent answers so they won't be rattled. Secondly, we want to challenge/dare skeptics and non-believers to participate in a rational discussion about these issues.

### SHEEPDOGS

Young Christian men need encouragement and accountability. Some need the basics of the faith reinforced. Some need to hear what they've already heard, but from a different voice. Some need opportunities to serve with their hands. Others need to be exhorted and equipped to minister to their peers. The young men's discipleship ministry I've labeled "Sheepdogs" targets these things. This fall there are twenty-four young men in two Sheepdog groups. In these groups they work through a series of topical Bible studies, memorize Scripture, and are personally mentored by Mr. Gray. The goal is for the Sheepdogs then to team up and lead other student Bible studies through the same material. So far there are eight other studies led by the Sheepdogs. They also volunteer some of their time to serve the church and community. Recently, we gathered, split and delivered several cords of firewood. They'll also be involved in leaf-raking, snow shoveling and other projects usually organized by Sabbath House. The glory of young men is their strength. Proverbs 20:29




#### **DEBATE!**

On September 13, at the UI Student Union Ballroom, CRF hosted a debate between Christ Church pastor Douglas Wilson and Clarke Cooper, Executive Director of the Log Cabin Republicans, with over 600 in attendance.

The topic was Do Gay Rights Conflict with Conservative Christian Values? While the debate itself was a bit unsatisfying in that Cooper (who claimed to be a conservative Christian) wouldn't engage any deeper than political sloganeering, the venue provided a great opportunity to bring some very important issues to the surface. The topic quickly narrowed to gay marriage and what's really at stake. Wilson argued that if we disconnect the definition of marriage from God's Word, we open the door to whatever the next perversion might



be--polygamy, incest, bestiality, etc. Christians need to understand the deeper issue and be able to talk rationally about it. This event, while not the definitive clash we hoped for, was a very helpful example of how Christians should engage on this issue, both inside and outside the church.



## FROM YOU...

I graduated from the University of Idaho in 2006, and I am now pursuing a Master's degree in economics from the University of California in Santa Barbara. I was involved with CRF for four years as a student at the University of Idaho. I became a Christian in my sophomore year of college so my involvement with CRF was immensely helpful in my development as a young Christian. The Bible studies and weekly meetings were at least ten times as enjoyable as Philosophy 101 and one hundred times more beneficial.

Through the Bible studies and the time I spent with other young men in CRF, I was pushed to learn more about my faith and to be a bold ambassador for Christ on a secular campus. At CRF, I learned to understand the gospel with my both my heart and my mind, both of which were routinely employed in my conversations with

non-Christians at the university. I also learned how to share burdens with my brothers and to pray for their needs. In the process, I was knit together with a band of men whom I still speak to and pray for regularly.

Later in my time at the U of I became involved with Mr. Gray's group of Sheepdogs. I recall heading out to the woods on cold Saturday mornings, in a van full of sleepy dudes, to go chop firewood and learn from Mr. Gray through both his work habits and his spiritual guidance. I also recall numerous one-on-one conversations with Mr. Gray and with other Christians in the group that helped me to make important life decisions. Looking back, it's amazing how much I was learning while not even realizing that I was learning. Thanks CRF!
